2. A data-protection impact assessment

Harm has also been identified in releasing all details within the data-protection impact assessment therefore, Section 31 (1) (a) (b) Law Enforcement is to be considered as part of the Public Interest Test.

A Public Interest Test has been carried out to weigh up the reasons for and against disclosure of the information requested, to ensure the release is in the interest of the public as a whole and not just the applicant.

Section 31 (1) – Law Enforcement

To disclose some details within the data-protection impact assessment may assist potential attackers. It would leave us vulnerable to cyber attacks as we are providing information to those intent on committing crime. This would impact our ability to carry out our policing functions.

Section 40 is a class based exemption, therefore it is not necessary to evidence harm caused by disclosure.

The data protection rights of a third party would be breached by disclosure (i.e. names within the document), therefore section 40(2) is an absolute exemption and a Public Interest Test is not necessary.

To provide the full data-protection impact assessment would lead to a better informed public and provide confidences for how the force is protected.

Factors against disclosure

To disclose the full data-protection impact assessment would provide terrorists and individuals intent on carrying out criminal activity with information on what security we use which could be exploited, leave us vulnerable to attacks and and hinder us carrying out our role as a police force.

Balancing Test

The Police Service is charged with enforcing the law, preventing and detecting crime and protecting the communities we serve. As part of that policing purpose, information is gathered which can be highly sensitive relating to high profile investigative activity. Weakening any of our security would place the Force and potentially the country at an increased level of danger.

In addition anything that places that confidence at risk, no matter how generic, would undermine any trust or confidence individuals have in the Police Service. Therefore, at this moment in time, it is our opinion that for these issues the balance test favours not disclosure.

Therefore, in accordance with the Freedom of Information Act 2000, this letter acts as a Refusal Notice under section 17 (1) of the legislation.

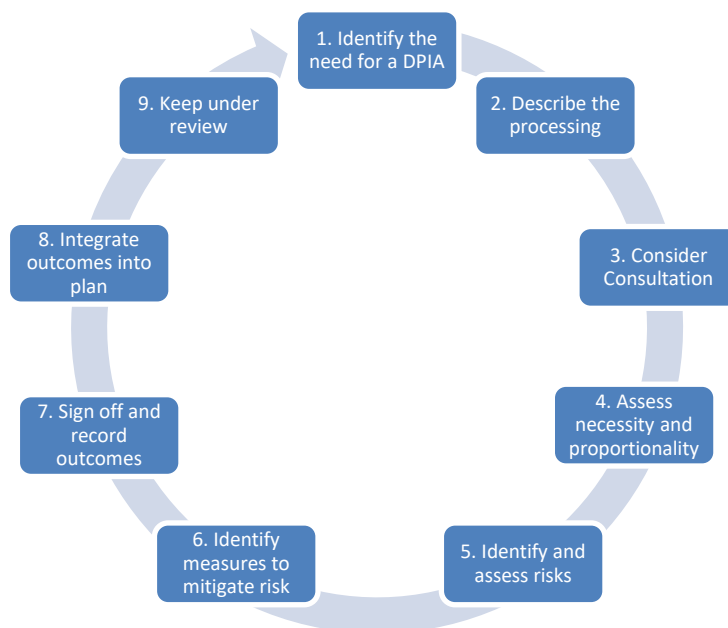

Neighbourhood Alert is secure, web-based two-way national community messaging system which will enable North Wales Police, Neighbourhood Watch and other public sector partners to deliver targeted, relevant messages on crime and disorder to specific groups of users, based on a wide range of criteria.

The enhanced survey module will enable North Wales Police to undertake local surveys on crime and disorder to understand community concerns and issues so the police are able to respond effectively to their priorities as outlined under the Crime and Disorder Act 1998.

The survey module will also be used to undertake victim satisfaction surveys to help improve our service and meet the requirements of the Victims Code as part of the Domestic Violence, Crime and Victims Act 2004 and potential new Victim's Law which is currently being considered by Parliament.

The system will enable North Wales Police to undertake targeted engagement with our diverse communities and enable the Force to meet the requirements of the general. and specific duties of the Equality Act 2010.

The Neighbourhood Alert system will be used to help Chief Officers meet their legal requirements under Section 34 of the Police Reform and Social Responsibility Act 2011 which is for them to make arrangements to consult with the public in each neighbourhood, provide local information about crime and policing.

	The Neighbourhood Alert Network is a central secure system that enables an organisation to take out a county based Portal which provides access to the global tools and database of users within their county. It is a carefully controlled, permission led, geographically defined network of providers and end users. The true partnership approach to a global system delivers economies of scale and far more advanced facilities and services than any single system could. It also provides a one-stop-shop engagement tool for members of the public to access services, policing and Neighbourhood Watch resources. The purpose of the disclosure is to facilitate the collection and storage of membership details of members of the public/business in relation to crime initiatives for the prevention, detection and reduction of crime within specific spheres of activity (e.g. Business Crime, Neighbourhood Watch Schemes). The intended effect on individuals in through improved information sharing and communication this will help prevent crime and disorder, ensure North Wales Police and partners are responding to community concerns, and improve engagement, trust, victim satisfaction and confidence for communities.

The system provides opportunities to build trust, engagement with our diverse communities, change behaviours, helping to prevent crime and disorder and improve public confidence.

	The North Wales Police Users will include staff from: • LPS SMT. • Nominated staff from LPS Teams. • Neighbourhood Policing Teams. • Corporate Communications. • Corporate Services including Diversity Unit, Workforce representation and Business Intelligence Unit. • Nominated authorised staff from other Business Areas. A wide range of very specific and advanced permissions can be set per individual and based on a saved criterion for a role. These permissions can be changed by top level administrators and updated instantly across all role members. Specific administration access levels enable the close control of user data access per administrator by type of registered user. Access can be given to sections of the database based on user's profile, affiliations and memberships. Access can also, if required, over-ride standard geographic restrictions; types of specific access to groups include: 1) Neighbourhood Watch members 2) All users based on Beat areas 3) Business data, business types and user roles 4) Bespoke, configurable user sets 5) All Watch and Interest group membership 6) Restricted and/or hidden groups (victims, witnesses) This high level of advanced permissions enables North Wales Police, when required, to grant very specific access in order to make an administrator's use of the system highly flexible and purposeful...

A small number of key organisations are represented on the system as "Information Providers". These are "The Police", "The OPCC", "Local Authorities", "Neighbourhood Watch", "Trading Standards", and "The Fire Service" Information providers are defined within the website terms as the local, licenced organisations representing each organisation (i.e. the local Police force or Constabulary). Neighbourhood Watch is defined as National and Home Watch Network and their local representatives.

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	North Wales Police “own” and are responsible for your exclusive, partitioned database within the Alert system. However North Wales Police has the option of making other Information Providers available to its users. The users in North Wales Police database will then decide themselves, using their own secure administration tools, whether they want to engage with these Information Providers or not. If North Wales Police imports a database into the system they will be the only user that can see these users until such time as they decide to share their data with other Information Providers (and join their database). Individual users can choose to opt in or continue to consent to the provision of their Data to an additional Information Provider, the user’s contact information will be shared as Global Data under a separate Data Processing Agreement with that Information Provider. This will not affect the original System Owner’s access and ownership of the original record.

The following information was provided to VISAV from ICO in relation to young people. <i>We contacted the ICO on 23 May 2018 to obtain clarification on the 13 year age limit set in the GDPR legislation. The response was as follows:-</i> <i>"First of all, it's not marketing, this is a messaging service that people sign up to, so if you put a limit on it that's up to you. There is nothing in the legislation anywhere that says about an age unless of course we are talking about providing services to children where it's like the internet or mobile phones or something like that. So, if you feel that the content of it would be age appropriate, then you can set your own age limit on it; they are actively giving their consent to receive that information so it's up to you what content might be in it and whether it's appropriate for certain age groups.</i> Information may be shared in relation to missing people which may include children and vulnerable people in order to help locate them. Any sharing of information will be done in accordance with the Missing Persons Policies and Procedures.

If any further use of the system or wider applications are required this will be subject of business case/approval by Supt Prevention and/or SLT to ensure it meets the aims of the Purpose.
